

# Tiva™ C Series TM4C129X Development Kit ReadMe First

The Tiva TM4C129X Development Kit provides a feature-rich development platform that allows users to evaluate Tiva TM4C129x series microcontrollers (MCUs). The development board features a 10/100-Mbit Ethernet interface, an on-board QVGA color display with resistive touch screen, an In-Circuit Debugging Interface (ICDI), microSD card slot, USB Host, Device, and OTG capabilities, and multiple connectors for expandability. The board comes preprogrammed with a quickstart application that is ready to use out of the box to view weather data provided by Open Weather Map (openweathermap.org) for any major city in the world.

# 1 Using the DK-TM4C129X Development Board

#### 1.1 Requirements

- A PC, with a USB interface, running Microsoft® Windows® 2000 or later
- Tiva TM4C129X Development Kit Documentation and Software USB Flash Drive

#### 1.2 Board Set-Up

The DK-TM4C129X Development Board is configured for immediate use. Before the board is powered on and connected to the computer for the first time, ensure that the Power Select shunt (J11) on the left side of the board is connected between the center pin and the pin labeled *ICDI*. To power the board, connect one of the USB Micro-B cables supplied in the kit to the USB Connector labeled *Debugger USB* on the right edge of the board. Connect the other end of the cable (Type A) to a free USB port on your host PC. This USB port provides debug and Virtual COM Port connectivity when the appropriate drivers and software are installed on the host PC. If connecting the board through a USB hub, it must be a powered hub.

Once the board powers up, the power LEDs at the center left of the board (D9 and D10) light up and the preloaded quickstart application begins to run. The Texas Instruments logo appears on the color QVGA screen as shown in Figure 1 followed by a screen populated with "--" entries for the weather data for Austin, Texas as shown in Figure 2.

If your computer is on a network behind a corporate firewall, you may need to enter information on your corporate proxy server to access the internet. In this case, swipe top to bottom on the screen to access the Configuration screen shown in Figure 3 and slide the "Proxy" switch to the "On" position.

Tap inside the proxy data field and a touch screen keyboard is shown as in Figure 4. Enter the proxy information using the keyboard and touch "Ent."

You then return to the Configuration display. Swipe bottom to top to return to the weather data display. Data becomes available for each city, as shown in Figure 5, sequentially with a delay of a few seconds between cities. Swipe left to right or right to left to scroll through the list of pre-programmed cities.

If you enter a city name that cannot be found, the screen displays "City Not Found." Figure 6 shows the result when the character "h" is entered.

#### 1.3 Install Drivers on the Host Computer

In order to debug and download a custom application in the microcontroller's flash memory and use Virtual COM Port connectivity, you must first install the following drivers on the host computer:

- Stellaris Virtual Serial Port
- Stellaris ICDI JTAG/SWD
- Stellaris ICDI DFU

Please see SPMU287 for detailed instructions on the driver install process.

These drivers provide the debugger with access to the JTAG/SWD interface and the host PC with access to the Virtual COM Port. With these drivers installed, Windows automatically detects any new Tiva boards (with a Stellaris ICDI) that you connect to your computer and installs the required drivers for you.

### 2 Configuring the Weather Display Quickstart Application

The DK-TM4C129X development board comes preprogrammed with the Weather Display quickstart application. Once you power the board and connect it to the internet with an Ethernet cable, this application runs automatically. The quickstart application displays current weather data along with forecasted high and low temperatures for 30 cities around the world. The user can input another city to see data for that city and can configure temperature data to display in degrees Celsius or degrees Fahrenheit. The application supports the use of an internet proxy that can be entered by the user.

Swipe your finger across the screen to the left or right to scroll through the pre-programmed cities. Swipe your finger down the screen to get to the Configuration display, which provides the following options:

- Toggle switch to enable a custom city and a city data field to enter the city name. The city name should be entered as "City, State" for cities in the United States and "City, Country" for cities in other countries. The city that is manually entered appears in the city list after Vancouver, Canada.
- Toggle switch to enable a proxy server and a proxy data field to enter the proxy information.
- Toggle switch to change from degrees Celsius or degrees Fahrenheit.

The MAC and IP addresses are visible at the bottom of the Configuration display. If you enter a custom city or a proxy server, this information is stored away from the application in Flash memory and persists if the application is reprogrammed onto the board. To remove these entries, you must erase the entire Flash memory.

### 3 Using the Weather Display Quickstart Application

You can navigate among the screens by swiping on the screen. Side-to-side swipes scroll through the list of cities. Swiping top to bottom opens the Configuration display and swiping bottom to top closes the Configuration display. In addition, you can tap the screen to bring up some navigational arrows. Tap the arrows to move through the city list. Tap the tab at the top to open the Configuration display and tap the tab at the bottom to close it.

Note that there may be a small delay in data availability as data is obtained from Open Weather Map. The application uses the lwIP stack to obtain an address through DNS, resolve the address of the Open Weather Map site and then build and handle all of the requests necessary to access the weather information. The data is updated once when the application starts, so any subsequent views of the data are not updated. To update the weather data, press the Reset button. Be aware that the Open Weather Map site limits the number of requests coming from a single IP address and may fail to respond if a request for data for a city is made more often than once every 10 minutes.

**NOTE:** The ICDI drivers identify themselves as Stellaris ICDI, but they work properly with both Stellaris and Tiva microcontroller kits.



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#### 4 Software Development Tools

To begin exploring other software examples and create your own projects, open the directory on the included USB flash drive and install the TivaWare package using the installer in the */TivaWare* directory. Also install and run the software development tools such as CCS, CodeBench, IAR, Keil, LM Flash Programmer, and so on, that are included in the */Tools* folder.

# 5 Debugging

In order to download code to the microcontroller's flash memory and debug the code, the onboard ICDI can be used. The onboard ICDI supports source-level debugging and code download to the microcontroller's flash memory using supported toolchains.
