





Typical Application

Design Considerations

The KA79L05A fixed voltage-regulator is designed with thermal overload protection that shuts down the circuit when subjected to an excessive power overload condition. Internal short-circuit protection limits the maximum current the circuit will pass. In many low current applications, compensation capacitors are not required. However, it is recommended that the regulator input be bypassed with a capacitor if the regulator is connected to the power supply filter with long wire lengths, or if the output load capacitance is large. An input bypass capacitor should be selected to provide good high-frequency characteristics to ensure stable operation under all load conditions. A 0.33 μ F or larger tantalum, mylar, or other capacitor having low internal impedance at high frequencies should be chosen. The bypass capacitor should be mounted with the shortest possible leads directly across the regulator's input terminals. Good construction techniques should be used to minimize ground loops and lead resistance drops since the regulator has no external sense lead. Bypassing the output is also recommended.






Figure 2. Positive and Negative Regulator


Figure 3. Typical Application


A common ground is required between the input and the output voltages. The input voltage must remain typically 2.0 V above the output voltage, even during the low point on the input ripple voltage.

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- * C₁ is required if regulator is located an appreciable distance from power supply filter.
- ** C_O improves stability and transient response.

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
